INDICATORS OF PRIMARY HEALTH CARE

Definition of an indicator:

- Measurable variable used as a representation of an associated factor or quantity.
- ·Health indicators are summary measures that are designed to describe particular aspects of health or health system performance.

• A health indicator is a single measure that is reported on regularly and that provides relevant information about population health and/or health system performance and characteristics.
